The children have their nasal flu vaccines on Thursday, so please ensure all permissions have been completed if you would like your child to have this protection from the winter nasties.



Whether allowing players to send text messages to one another or letting them use their mics to chat together on voice if your child is on a multiplayer game, chances are they can talk to fellow gamers, one way or another.

Sadly, such a function comes with its fair share of risks – as is to be expected with a feature intended to connect gamers from around the world and it is immensely important for parents and educators to understand these concerns and help young players address them. That's why The National College has put together this free guide and podcasts, breaking down the most prevalent issues associated with in-game chat and letting you know how to keep youngsters as safe as possible if or when they're exposed to this feature.
